With that encouragement and support, we successfully transitioned from Veterinarians Without Borders/Veterinarios Sin Fronteras-Latin America to the Global Alliance for Animals and People (GAAP).

Much of the year was spent reworking the mission, goals, objectives and vision for

the GAAP. We identified an entirely new set of donors and funders for our organization, and even added some new projects.

For this reason, you will find that the report this year is short and sweet. We spent less time in the field, and put some project on temporary hold. Bear with us- as 2015 is now upon us, we have ramped up all our projects, hired new staff, secured new funds and off we go!!

Vision and Mission

We envision a Latin America where people live in harmony with animals and their environment.

Our mission is to improve the health of animals, people, and the environment. We work in Latin American communities that are overwhelmed by the challenges and conflicts they face in their struggles to provide for their families and their animals.

Our projects

Veterinary Services, Todos Santos, Guatemala



Rabies is a serious disease with the highest case fatality rate of any disease known to man. There are still over 55,000 human deaths worldwide, most caused by domestic dogs. We have been involved in a rabies prevention and responsible dog ownership program in Todos Santos, Gautemala since 2008. Todos Santos is a small Mayan village about 7 hours from Guatemala City. Our ongoing work includes regular rabies vaccination campaigns of dogs and extensive education of adults and children about the risks of rabies, spay/neuter campaigns, and other veterinary services.

In March, 2014, we brought our regular program to Todos Santos. In ten days, we worked with over 1,000 community members and children in our education program. We vaccinated approximately 300 dogs and sterilized 75 dogs.

GAAP Clinic, Valdivia, Chile

In 2014, we received funding from the Humane Society International to open the GAAP Veterinary Clinic in Valdivia, Chile. Renovations of the building lasted four months, and in November 2014, we successfully passed the Ministry of Health inspection and opened our doors for business. The mission of our clinic is to service marginalized and rural communities of the region by subsidizing the cost of veterinary care through international donations of supplies. We have already had a number of patients and new clients arrive every day. We look forward to new developments in the clinic in 2015.



Humane Community Development, Puerto Natales, Chile



This free-roaming urban dog project in Puerto Natales, Chile received a lot of global attention in 2014. Based on the principle that the best solution to this serious issue is best developed by the community, we worked with the International Fund for Animal Welfare to guide the community through the steps of building a humane management plan. This pilot project is currently being

duplicated in Bosnia and received endorsement from the Clinton Global Initiative.




Figure 1. Timeline for Humane Community Development Project for free-roaming dog Project in Puerto Natales, Chile

The completed management plan involves a series of phases aimed at reducing the number of owned dogs permitted to roam unattended in the streets (see Figure 1 below). Steps include data collection such as surveys to find out what people think about the dog problem at the onset of the project, a six month period of public outreach, an owned dog, mandatory microchip campaign, followed by enforcement and final evaluation of the project.

Animals in Disasters, Chile

Chile is a country with many natural disasters; including earthquakes, tsunamis, volcanic eruptions, floods and drought, to name a few. In recent years, Chile received some unfavorable international attention concerning its performance in dealing with companion animals following a volcanic eruption and an earthquake/tsunami.

In 2014, the International Fund for Animal Welfare approached the GAAP to work together identifying stakeholders and to develop working groups to provide input toward a National Plan for Animals in Disasters for Chile that would be scalable to other communities of Latin America.

Resources and Financial Management

This year, we secured \$48.709.082 CLP of which half went to employee wages to maintain and start new project and to launch the new organization. Despite the major changes to our organizational structure, we finished out the year with a net worth of \$6.147.156. For 2015, we anticipate seeing a significant increase in restricted funds for the Disaster Project and the GAAP Clinic.
